The Great Bible, so named because of its size, was the first authorized edition of the English Bible issued in 1539 by King Henry VIII. Due to the scarcity of printed Bibles back then, they were chained to the stand for fear of being stolen.

"But God's Word is not chained!" Paul exclaimed, hundreds of years before that. And it is for this reason that we preach the Gospel, and we teach the Bible, "that they too may obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory" (2 Tim 2:9-10).
